from the president

Today there is a multitude of Bible colleges across America. What makes Fellowship Baptist College different? I believe there are five things that distinguish our college.

First, the administration and faculty believe in the authority of the local church. God ordained the local New Testament church to carry out His work in this dispensation. A Bible college should function under the authority and supervision of a local church. How can a Bible college that functions either independent of any local church authority or as the authority over a local church teach its students what a New Testament Baptist church is?

Second, at FBCI, preachers train preachers. Historically, schools that hire academics to train preachers lose their spiritual focus, tend to compromise, and eventually become secular institutions. Princeton, Harvard, and Yale began as preacher-training schools. In recent years, prominent Bible colleges once known for their zeal have bowed at the altar of academia and have lost their fire and purpose.

Third, the administration and faculty believe that the King James Version of the Bible is still God's Word for English speaking people.

Fourth, FBCI is tuition free. When I went to Bible college, I had four children. I worked a minimum of forty hours a week, supported my family, and went to school. I was able to earn a college degree because the school I attended was tuition free. I want to afford that same opportunity to another generation of young preachers.

Fifth, FBCI is a place where youngsters fresh out of high school can go to sort out God's will for their lives. Many young people enroll in colleges that seek to undermine their faith. Whether they attend for one year or four, FBCI is a place where they can grow up and become grounded in the truth.

In 1997 a group of like-minded pastors agreed that there was a need for a school with these characteristics. We began enrolling students that fall. Some of our graduates are working as pastors, evangelists, and teachers. Others who have secular jobs use the things they learned at FBCI as they serve in their local churches. God used our school to accomplish His will in their lives. Perhaps FBCI is a part of His will for your life.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Facilities

Location

Located in Mooresville, Indiana, just fifteen minutes from Indianapolis, Fellowship Baptist College is one of the most accessible Bible colleges in the country. Indianapolis is a progressive commercial and industrial center with many job opportunities.

Campus

The college is housed within the facilities of the Good Shepherd Baptist Church. The facilities include the church building—which contains classrooms, offices, and an auditorium—and an activity building where the dormitories, a library, a computer lab, and a gymnasium are located.

Dormitory Accommodations

Limited dormitory space is available for both male and female students. It is located on the property of Good Shepherd Baptist Church.

Student Life

Chapel

Chapel services are held each Wednesday at 11:00 AM. Visiting speakers include pastors from across the Midwest, evangelists, and missionaries who are home from the field. Attendance is required.

Classes

Classes are held only during the morning, from 8:00 to 12:00 a.m., leaving afternoons and evenings free for study or work. Regular class attendance is required. For illness or emergencies, students are allowed a number of absences equal to the number of credit hours per class.

Church Attendance

Participation in the services of Good Shepherd Baptist Church is an important element in the educational experience at Fellowship Baptist College. All students, married or single, who move to Indianapolis to attend FBCI are required to join Good Shepherd Baptist Church. Students who are residents of the Indianapolis area prior to enrollment in the college will be exempt from this requirement. (Other exceptions are specified in the *Student Handbook*.)

Students must attend all regularly scheduled church services. Any exceptions to this requirement must be approved on an individual basis by the Dean of Students.

Christian Service

There are many opportunities for Christian service at Good Shepherd Baptist Church and in the community. Students may assist at church youth activities, participate in services at nursing homes and rescue missions, attend regular church visitation, provide special music for church services, and teach or assist in Sunday school classes and junior church. Men have opportunities to preach at various college activities or at churches in the area.

Students are required to serve two semesters of apprenticeship in each of four areas. At Good Shepherd Baptist Church the four areas are the bus ministry, junior church, Sunday School (as a teacher or assistant), and Master's Club. Students who attend a church that does not have these ministries may substitute other ministries with the approval of the Dean of Students.

If students attend a church that has a choir, they are required to attend choir practices and to sing in the church choir.

Conduct

Students are expected to maintain scriptural standards of conduct and appearance. A demerit system is used for violations of standards set forth in the *Student Handbook*.

ADMISSIONS INFORMATION

Application Procedure

Applicants must submit the following items:

1. A completed application.
2. An official high school transcript.
3. An official transcript of all college or Bible school work completed.
4. A health certificate.
5. A brief statement of the applicant's salvation experience.
6. A brief statement of the applicant's objective and probable field of Christian service.
7. A recommendation from the applicant's pastor.
8. An application fee (\$40.00). The fee is not refundable.

Admissions Policies

Fellowship Baptist College reserves the right to accept or reject any application based on the recommendation of the president of the college and the Advisory Board.

Students may be admitted on the following bases:

1. Graduation from high school (public, private or home school) with a grade average of "C" or above.

2. Probationary admission of students with a grade average below a “C” or students who have not procured a diploma.

Transfers from Other Colleges

Applicants wishing to transfer from another college must submit an official transcript from each college they have attended.

Transferring students must be eligible to reenter the college they last attended. For courses taken elsewhere, credit will be transferred according to the following policies:

- Only credits for courses passed with a grade of “C” or above will be transferred.
- To count toward a major, the content of a course must be equivalent to that of courses offered at FBCI. For courses not offered at FBCI, credits may be transferred as electives.
- The administration will determine whether credits earned at another institution meet the academic standards required for college credit.

Refunds

If a student withdraws or is dismissed from Fellowship Baptist College, a portion of room and board and a portion of some (though not all) other fees may be refunded. A student who withdraws during the first two weeks of a month will receive a refund of at least one-half the room and board for that month. A student who withdraws during the last two weeks of a month will receive no refund. Textbook fees and supply fees are not refundable.

Change in Fees

The administration reserves the right to adjust fees at the beginning of any semester.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

Grading System

The grading system is as follows:

A - Superior (93-100)

B - Above Average (85-92)

C - Average or Satisfactory (77-84)

D - Below Average or Poor (70-76)

F - Failure (Below 70)

I - Incomplete (If work is not completed during the following semester, the grade will be changed to an "F".)

Grade Reports

Grade reports will be issued at the close of each semester. One copy will be sent to the student; a second copy will be mailed to the parents of minor students.

Grade Points

Students must maintain a grade point average of at least 2.0 during their course of study. Grade points are assigned as follows:

A	4.0 points
B	3.0 points
C	2.0 points
D	1.0 point
F	0 points

Scholastic Probation and Suspension

Any student having an average below 2.0 for a semester's work will be placed on academic probation for the following semester. The student must maintain a 2.0 average during that semester. Students who do not will be placed on academic suspension for one semester. Students who return after a suspension will be accepted on probation. They must maintain a 2.0 average during that semester or be dismissed from the college.

Special Honors

Awards for academic excellence and Christian conduct will become a part of a student's permanent record.

Degrees Offered

One-Year Certificate, Bible Major

The One-Year Certificate is provided so that students may receive a year of Bible instruction before going on to a secular college or career. The one-year course is a combination of Bible, Christian service, and general courses. In addition to 21 semester hours of Bible courses, students take classes in English composition, computer applications, effective study methods, and personal finance.

Associate of Science Degree, Secretarial Studies

The two-year business major is intended for students who desire secretarial training. It focuses on the skills needed for serving in a church, in a Christian school, or on the mission field. Besides 26 semester hours of business classes and 14 semester hours of Bible courses, students take classes in study methods, English composition, and speech.

Bachelor of Arts Degree, Bible Major

The degree requirements at Fellowship Baptist College are structured so that every student who completes a Bachelor's Degree will have a major in Bible. Every student graduates with at least 66 credits in theological and practical Bible courses (prefixes Bi, NT, OT, and Pr in the course descriptions). In addition, the following general courses (33 credits) are required for a Bachelor's Degree.

English	15 semester hours
Each student is required to complete both semesters of English Grammar and Composition (En 101 and En 102) with a grade of C or above. The other required courses are American Literature (En 203), British Literature (En 305), and Fundamentals of Speech (En 215).

Minors

Within the Bible major, students have a choice of 4 minors.

- *Theology*: for men who desire to be pastors and youth workers.
- *Missions*: for students who desire to serve in foreign or home mission.
- *Christian Education*: for student who desire to teach in Christian schools, home schools, and church education programs.
- *Music*: for students who wish to work as ministers of music or church musicians.

Requirements

Theology Minor

- an additional 22 Bible credits: 16 in Pastoral Studies and 6 in Practical Studies.
- The foreign language requirement must include Introduction to Greek (AL 401) and Introduction to Hebrew (AL 412). Students who did not take a foreign language in high school must also take Introduction to Spanish (ML 101).

Missions Minor (Men)

- an additional 22 Bible credits: 16 in Pastoral Studies and 6 in Practical Studies.
- The foreign language requirement must include Introduction to Greek (AL 401) and Introduction to Hebrew (AL 412). Students who did not take a foreign language in high school must also take Introduction to Spanish (ML 101).

Missions Minor (Women)

- an additional 4 semester hours of Practical Studies (Christian Womanhood, The Pastor's Wife, Biographies of Great Missionaries).
- an additional 10 semester hours of Christian Education courses (Early Childhood Development, Elementary Education, Christian Education).
- 4 semester hours of Home Economics courses.

Christian Education Minor (Men)

- an additional 18 semester hours of Christian Education courses.
- 8 semester hours of electives.

Christian Education Minor (Women)

- an additional 18 semester hours of Christian Education courses.
- an additional 4 semester hours of Practical Studies courses (including Christian Womanhood and The Pastor's Wife).
- 4 semester hours of Home Economics courses.

Music Minor (Men)

- 20 semester hours of music courses. Students must take four semesters of voice lessons or four semesters of piano. After completing the requirement, they may continue to take lessons in either instrument, but the credits earned do not apply to the hours required for the minor.
- 4 semester hours of electives.

Music Minor (Women)

- 20 semester hours of music courses. Students must take four semesters of voice lessons or four semesters of piano. After completing the requirement, they may continue to take lessons in either instrument, but the credits earned do not apply to the hours required for the minor.
- an additional 2 semester hours of Practical Studies courses (including Christian Womanhood and The Pastor's Wife).
- 4 semester hours of Home Economics courses.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

BIBLE

Bible

Bi 101 Bible Doctrines

An introduction to biblical doctrines, including Christology, pneumatology, angelology, and others. *3 hours, first semester*

Bi 102 Bible Doctrines

A continuation of the study of biblical doctrines, including soteriology, ecclesiology, eschatology, and others. *3 hours, second semester*

Bi 135 Apologetics

A defense of biblical teaching on topics frequently attacked by critics, such as creation, the authority of Scripture, the existence of God, the resurrection of Christ, and the reality of miracles. *1 hour, second semester*

Bi 242 Eschatology

A study of prophecy concerning the end times with an emphasis on the books of Daniel and Revelation. *2 hours, first semester*

Bi 243 Soteriology

A study of the doctrines of salvation, including repentance, faith, regeneration, adoption, and salvation. *2 hours, second semester*

Bi 420 Bibliology

A study of the authority, inspiration, infallibility, and inerrancy of the Bible. *2 hours, second semester*

Bi 425 Angelology

A study of the nature and ministry of angels, the person and work of Satan, and the work of demons. *2 hours, second semester*

Bi 430 Nature and Attributes of God

A study of God's nature and His attributes, including His knowledge, sovereignty, immutability, holiness, power, and love. *2 hours, first semester*

Bi 435 Ecclesiology

A study of the organization, ordinances, and purpose of the local church. *2 hours, second semester*

Bi 463 Senior Thesis I

Students begin organizing, researching, and writing a ten thousand word paper on a topic related to their major. *2 hours, first semester*

Bi 464 Senior Thesis II

Students continue writing and revising a ten thousand word paper. *2 hours, second semester*

New Testament

NT 120 Life of Christ

A study of the life of Christ from his birth through his early ministry. *3 hours, first semester*

NT 121 Life of Christ

A study of the life of Christ from his later ministry through His ascension. *3 hours, second semester*

NT 223 New Testament Survey

A general introduction to the books of the New Testament, noting the author, purpose, and major themes of each. *3 hours, first semester*

NT 224 General Epistles

A study of the books of James; I and II Peter; I, II, and III John; and Jude. *2 hours, first semester*

NT 325 Romans

After a discussion of the historical background of the epistle, students begin a chapter by chapter study of Paul's arguments and his teachings on the doctrines of salvation. *2 hours, first semester*

NT 327 Hebrews

A verse by verse study of Hebrews; its presentation of Christ as our mediator and high priest, and its instruction in walking by faith. *2 hours, second semester*

Old Testament

OT 234 Genesis

A study of the book of Genesis, presenting it as foundational to a proper understanding of the Bible. Covers creation, the flood, and the lives of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. *2 hours, first semester*

OT 321 Poetic Books

Examines the characteristics of Hebrew poetry and the content and interpretation of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon. *2 hours, second semester*

OT 331 Old Testament Survey

A survey of the Old Testament, beginning with Genesis and continuing through the reign of Saul. *3 hours, first semester*

OT 332 Old Testament Survey

A survey of the Old Testament, beginning with the reign of David and concluding with the writings of the major and minor prophets. *3 hours, second semester*

*Pastoral Studies***Pa 252 Pastoral Theology**

A study of the call, the character, and the responsibilities of the pastor. Students practice performing weddings and baptisms, conducting funerals, administering the Lord's Supper, conducting business meetings, and performing other tasks that are a part of the ministry. *2 hours, first semester*

Pa 254 Pastoral Leadership

Beginning with an examination of Christ as a leader, this course is a study of scriptural methods of leadership. It includes guidelines for such things as selecting and training staff, delegating authority, resolving conflicts, and motivating the staff and membership. *2 hours, second semester*

Pa 361 Homiletics

Principles of sermon preparation. Teaches correct outline form; developing topical, textual, and expository messages; sources and use of illustrations; principles for analyzing sources of support material; and developing effective introductions and conclusions. *3 hours, first semester*

Pa 362 Homiletics

Principles of sermon delivery; instruction in platform and vocal techniques. Provides opportunities to apply the principles in a classroom setting. *3 hours, second semester*

Pa 415 Hermeneutics

A study of the literal method of interpreting Scripture, emphasizing the principle that the Bible is its own interpreter. Students learn the importance of factors such as context, genre, and history. *2 hours, second semester*

Pa 451 Practice Preaching

Each week students prepare a message and deliver it in a classroom situation where they are evaluated by other ministerial students. *2 hours, first semester*

Pa 452 Practice Preaching

Continued weekly practice in preparing, delivering, and evaluating sermons in a classroom setting. *2 hours, second semester*

*Practical Studies***Pr 113 Methods of Bible Study**

An examination of methods and tools for studying and correctly interpreting Scripture. The course emphasizes the purpose of Bible study: learning principles to apply and commandments to obey rather than simply obtaining knowledge. *2 hours, second semester*

Pr 116 Christian Womanhood

A study of the conduct and qualities that should be characteristic of the Christian woman; her role in the home, in the church, and in society. *1 hour, first semester*

Pr 117 Personal Evangelism

A course designed to train students in effective methods of soul winning and to prepare them for dealing with situations and questions that commonly confront the soul winner. *2 hours, first semester*

Pr 133 Music in the Bible

A study of the nature and purpose of music in Old Testament worship and in the New Testament church. Scriptural principles are applied to current church music to determine what kind of music is acceptable to God. *1 hour, second semester*

Pr 141 Congregational Conducting

Students learn basic conducting patterns, the application of the patterns to song leading, platform techniques, and song selection. *1 hour, second semester*

Pr 151 The Pastor's Wife

Examines the responsibilities of the pastor's wife, the problems she may face, and her opportunities for service in the home and in the church. *1 hour, second semester*

Pr 204 Biographies of Great Missionaries

Examines the lives of Hudson Taylor, Adoniram Judson, and other missionaries, focusing on the qualities that made their ministries effective. *2 hours, second semester*

Pr 212 Christian Maturity

A discussion of the characteristics of the mature Christian and instruction in how to develop them. Subjects include developing biblical convictions and conduct, maintaining a consistent devotional life, and growth in love, sacrifice, faith, and service. *2 hours, first semester*

Pr 250 Youth Work

A course designed to prepare the student for the youth ministry. Topics include the spiritual qualifications of the youth worker, building and promoting a youth program, the selection and development of workers, staff relationships, and dangers of the youth ministry and how to avoid them. *2 hours, modular*

Pr 253 Biblical Counseling

This course teaches principles of biblical counseling. Includes instruction in identifying problems and in developing a scriptural approach to resolving them. *2 hours, second semester*

Pa 261 Church Business Administration

A study of the financial organization and administration of a local church. Includes instruction in ministerial ethics; legal liabilities; managing time and money; and the management of the church office, staff, and property. *1 hour, second semester*

Pr 318 Baptist History

A study of the origin and continuity of the Baptists. Includes a study of early movements that defended Baptist distinctives, such as the Paulicians, Waldenses, and Anabaptists. 3 hours, second semester

Pr 460 Church Planting

A course designed to equip pastors and missionaries to plant churches. Covers such topics as choosing a location; visitation; finding and adapting facilities; financing, promoting, and organizing the church; and establishing a constitution. 2 hours, first semester

Pr 463 Sunday School Administration

How to organize and plan the operation of a Sunday School. Includes the history of the Sunday school movement, selecting and training teachers, establishing objectives, selecting curriculum, visitation, and promoting the program. 2 hours, first semester

BUSINESS

Bu 101 Computer Applications

An introduction to word processing, spreadsheets, database management, desktop publishing, and powerpoint. 1 hour, first semester

Bu 104 Keyboarding I

An introduction to computer keyboarding, the class emphasizes the development of speed and accuracy. Includes instruction in the production and formatting of business correspondence. 2 hours, first semester

Bu 105 Keyboarding II

Continued practice in computer keyboarding. Students work to increase speed and accuracy. 2 hours, second semester

Bu 107 Shorthand I

Instruction in shorthand writing, emphasizing transcription, reading, and correct strokes. 2 hours, first semester

Bu 108 Shorthand II

Continued instruction in shorthand writing. 2 hours, second semester

Bu 218 Word Processing

Students practice creating, formatting, and editing documents and work with tables and various writing tools. 2 hours, first semester

Bu 219 Desktop Publishing

Students work with desktop publishing software to design and publish brochures, booklets, and other documents. 2 hours, second semester

Bu 221 Business Communications

Training in both written and oral communication. Students create and edit letters and written reports, and organize and deliver oral presentations. *2 hours, second semester*

Bu 230 Filing and Records Management

A study of alphabetic, numeric, subject, and geographic filing systems. Instruction in both computer and manual systems. *2 hours, second semester*

Bu 235 Office Management

Presents methods for managing time and staff to produce an efficient, effective workplace. Addresses matters such as staff training and the planning and conducting of staff meetings. Includes instruction in business ethics and office etiquette. *2 hours, first semester*

Bu 237 Office Training

Students observe and work in an office, learning to perform tasks such as operating office machines, taking notes in staff meetings, answering telephones, and preparing mailings. *3 hours, first semester*

Bu 241 Personal Finance

This practical course on good stewardship of personal finances covers topics such as budgets, credit cards, insurance, home ownership, and investments. *1 hour, second semester*

Bu 242 Church Finances and Accounting

This course in accounting procedures for handling church finances begins with learning the accounting cycles. It includes practice in banking procedures, preparing financial reports, and computing a payroll. *2 hours, second semester*

Bu 245 Office Internship

Students work for 20 hours in a business office. *1 hour, second semester*

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

CE 103 Methods of Study

A practical course in learning effective study habits. Includes instruction in note taking and outlining; the use of dictionaries, thesauruses, lexicons, and libraries; the use of the computer as a study tool; and techniques to improve retention. *2 hours, first semester*

CE 204 Early Childhood Development

A course that examines the physical, intellectual, emotional, and social development of the child from conception through kindergarten; and the characteristics of learning environments appropriate for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers. *3 hours, first semester*

CE 215 Elementary Education

A survey of teaching methods effective in the elementary classroom. It includes instruction in lesson planning and classroom management. *3 hours, second semester*

CE 301 Christian Education I

This course examines the history of education from ancient times to the present, how cultural change brings about educational change, educational philosophy and methodology, and time management. *2 hours, first semester*

CE 302 Christian Education II

This course continues instruction in educational philosophy and methodology. It covers classroom management, the development of lesson and unit plans, strategies for teaching literacy, and methods of assessment. *2 hours, second semester*

CE 421 Student Teaching I

Under the supervision of an experienced teacher, the student teacher will make lesson plans, prepare instructional materials, and teach classes. *4 hours, first semester*

CE 422 Student Teaching II

Under the supervision of an experienced teacher, the student teacher will make lesson plans, prepare instructional materials, and teach classes. *4 hours, second semester*

CE 463 Senior Thesis I

Students begin organizing, researching, and writing a ten thousand word paper on a topic related to their major. *2 hours, first semester*

CE 464 Senior Thesis II

Students continue writing and revising a ten thousand word paper. *2 hours, second semester*

ENGLISH LANGUAGE

En 101 English Grammar and Composition I

Emphasis on developing paragraphs and writing informative and persuasive essays. Students review the parts of speech, complements, and sentence structure. *3 hours, first semester*

En 102 English Grammar and Composition II

Focuses on writing a library paper, emphasizing research and documentation. Students review agreement, pronoun and verb usage, and punctuation. *3 hours, second semester*

En 203 American Literature

A survey of American literature from colonial times to the present. *3 hours*

En 215 Fundamentals of Speech

A study of the basic principles of public speaking. Students develop and deliver informative and persuasive speeches, interpret poetry, and participate in reader's theatre. *3 hours, first semester*

En 305 British Literature

A survey of British literature from *Beowulf* to the present. *3 hours*

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

*Ancient Languages***AL 401 Introduction to Greek**

An introduction to the Greek alphabet and to Greek grammar, syntax, and vocabulary. *3 hours, first semester*

AL 412 Introduction to Hebrew

An introduction to the Hebrew alphabet and to Hebrew grammar, syntax, and vocabulary. *3 hours, first semester*

*Modern Languages***ML 101 Introduction to Spanish**

Intended for the beginner. Students learn the basics of Spanish grammar and syntax and apply them in written and oral communication. *2 hours, first semester*

HISTORY

Hi 201 United States History I

A study of the history of the United States, beginning with the early explorers and ending with the War of 1812. *2 hours, first semester*

Hi 202 United States History II

A study of the history of the United States from the early nineteenth century to the present. *2 hours, second semester*

HOME ECONOMICS

HE 115 Home Economics

Instruction and practice in meal planning and food preparation, including food storage, preparation, and service. *2 hours, first semester*

HE 116 Home Economics

Instruction and practice in sewing, including selecting fabrics and adapting patterns. Students complete projects in décor and clothing construction. The course also includes instruction in personal and family health. *2 hours, second semester*

MUSIC

Mu 101 Music Theory I

A study of the fundamentals of music theory, including scales, intervals, rhythmic notation, triads, seventh chords, inversions, figured base, voice leading, and principles of root position part writing. *3 hours*

Mu 102 Music Theory II

A study of harmonic progression, part writing first and second inversion triads, musical forms, non-chord tones, seventh chords, secondary dominants, and modulations. *3 hours*

Mu 103 Ear Training I

Students learn to identify melodies, harmonies, and rhythms through sight singing and ear training. *1 hour, first semester*

Mu 104 Ear Training II

Provides further practice in identifying melodies, harmonies, and rhythms through sight singing and ear training. *1 hour, second semester*

Mu 227 Elements of Conducting

Instruction in conducting techniques for leading choral and instrumental groups. *1 hour, first semester*

Mu 331 Choral Conducting

Provides practice in conducting techniques for interpreting choral music. Includes guidelines for selecting choral pieces, developing good choral tone, conducting rehearsals, and preparing scores. *2 hours, second semester*

Mu 412 Church Music Administration

This class teaches guidelines for scheduling rehearsals, building choral and instrumental groups, preparing special programs, budgeting, and record keeping. Includes principles for developing and maintaining a good relationship with the pastor, the church staff, and the congregation. *3 hours, first semester*

Mu 418 Music Technology

Students will use notation software to prepare scores. This course also develops an understanding of sound equipment and how it functions. The course includes an apprenticeship in operating sound equipment for church services. *2 hours, second semester*

Mu 463 Senior Thesis I

Students begin organizing, researching, and writing a ten thousand word paper on a topic related to their major. *2 hours, first semester*

Mu 464 Senior Thesis II

Students continue writing and revising a ten thousand word paper. *2 hours, second semester*

DOCTRINAL STATEMENT

SCRIPTURES

The Bible, including both the Old and New Testaments as translated from the *Textus Receptus*, is the inerrant, infallible, and inspired Word of God. These Scriptures are the final authority in all matters of faith and practice. The Bible reveals God, the fall of man, the way of salvation, and God's plan and purpose in the ages. (II Timothy 3:16; II Peter 1:20, 21)

SOVEREIGN GOD

God is a person, eternally existing as a Trinity in unity -- Father, Son and Holy Spirit -- three persons and yet one God. (Deuteronomy 6:4; Matthew 28:19; I Corinthians 8:6)

SON

Jesus Christ, eternally existing, is the only begotten Son of God, who became a man totally apart from sin, being conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary, and is true God and true man. (Luke 1:30-35; John 1:1-5; Philippians 2:5-8; Colossians 1:15)

SIN

Man was created in the image of God but fell through sin, bringing upon himself not only physical death but also spiritual death and separation from God. Now all mankind is totally depraved, having inherited a sinful nature bent toward sinning, and has become sinners by practice in thought, word, and deed. (Genesis 1:26-27, 2:16-17; 3:6-19; Romans 3:10-23; 6:23)

SACRIFICE

The Lord Jesus Christ suffered and died as a substitutionary sacrifice for the sins of the whole world. He arose from the dead in the body in which He was crucified. He ascended into Heaven in that glorified body, where He is seated at the right hand of God the Father, as the Head of the Church, making intercession for the saints as our High Priest. (Luke 24; Acts 1:9-11; Romans 5:8-10; Ephesians 1:20-23; I Peter 3:18)

SALVATION

Man is lost and must be born again to enter the kingdom of God. Salvation is by grace alone through personal faith in the finished work of Christ on the cross. The believer is thus eternally secure. (John 1:12; 3:3-7; Ephesians 3:21)

CHURCH

We believe the church was founded by Christ during His personal ministry and has had a continuous existence unto this day. We believe that the church is a local, visible body of believers, scripturally baptized and united on the principles of God's Word for the purpose of making, baptizing, and teaching disciples. (Matthew 16:18; 28:19-20; Ephesians 3:21)

SECOND COMING

The Lord Jesus Christ Himself is coming again in the air at any moment to catch up His saints and to reward their service. The unbelievers left will go through a period called the Tribulation, after which Christ will return visibly to the earth to set up His Millennial Kingdom of one thousand years of righteous rule. After this, the unbelievers of all ages will stand at the Great White Throne to be judged and cast into the Lake of Fire, separated from God forever, while the believers spend eternity in the fullness of the joy in Heaven with the Lord. (Matthew 24:29-42; I Thessalonians 4:16-18; Revelations 19:11; 20:15)

ADMINISTRATION AND FACULTY

PRESIDENT

Dr. Everett Barnard was saved in Hawaii in 1961 while serving in the Navy. A year later, while he was working in Pearl Harbor Shipyard and attending Fellowship Baptist Tabernacle, God called him to preach. He enrolled in Baptist Bible College in Springfield, Missouri, in the fall of 1963 and graduated with a Bachelor in Theology Degree in 1967.

Dr. Barnard served as an associate to Pastor Byers Story at Temple Baptist Church in Muncie, Indiana. He left there to start the New Testament Baptist Church in Dunkirk, Indiana. In the fall of 1970, he was called to Good Shepherd Baptist Church in Camby, Indiana, where he served as pastor until his retirement in 2008. Currently, as the president of Fellowship Baptist College of Indiana, he travels the country, speaking in churches and presenting the ministry of the college.

In 1976, Dr. Barnard helped found Fellowship Baptist College in East Peoria, Illinois, and served as its vice-president under three presidents. At various times, Dr. Barnard taught Church History, Eschatology, and Church Business Administration. In 1982, the college conferred upon him the Doctor of Divinity Degree.

In 1997, Dr. Barnard shared his burden to start a college with the International Fellowship of Baptists. He found that many other men had the same burden. Fellowship Baptist College of Indiana is the result of that burden.
